According to the **Arizona Capitol Times**, as of **Day 6** of the session, there are **649 bills posted** and **33 Memorials or Resolutions posted**. Both the Senate and the House are adjourned until Tuesday, January 22.

The Governor's Advisory Council on Aging tracks legislation that has the potential to impact older Arizonans. These bills are featured in the **FULL List**. We've just started tracking legislation; the FULL List is linked <u>HERE</u>. Currently we have 8 bills on the list and are reviewing 33.

Please be advised that the presence of a bill on a tracking list **does not** represent support or opposition by the Council. It **does** mean that the topic is something that may be of interest to or have an impact on older Arizonans. Note: the web report provides you with the current status and upcoming hearing information on all of the bills tracked by the Council and is available and updated on an ongoing basis 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Be sure to click on the bill number for more information as available. This list is edited and updated as we have opportunity to review bills throughout the session. ***S.2076 BOLD Infrastructure for Alzheimer's Act** Introduced on 11/67/2017 by Senator Susan M. Collins (ME)

Bill amends the Public Health Service Act to award cooperative agreements: (1) for establishment or support of national or regional centers of excellence in public health practice in Alzheimer's disease; (2) to state public health departments, Native American tribes, and other entities to promote cognitive functioning, address cognitive impairment and unique aspects of Alzheimer's disease, and help meet the needs of caregivers; (3) for analysis and public reporting of data on the state and national levels regarding cognitive decline, caregiving and health disparities, and monitoring of objectives on dementia and caregiving in the Dept. of Health and Human Services' Healthy People 2020 report. **12/31/2018 Became Public Law No. 115-406**

***H.R.259 Medicaid Extenders Act of 2019** Introduced on 1/4/2019 by Representative Frank Pallone, Jr.

The bill provides three-month extensions of both Medicaid home and community based services spousal impoverishment protections and the Money Follows the Person Program. **1/17/2019 to President**

***H.R.5075** Ashanti Alert Act of **2018** Introduced on 2/20/2018 by Representative Scott Taylor (VA-2) The bill directs the Department of Justice to establish a national communications network – the Ashanti Alert communications network – to support regional and local search efforts for missing adults. Latest action: 12/31/2018 Became Public Law No: 115-401

*H.R.269 Pandemic and All-Hazards Preparedness and Advancing Innovation Act of 2019

Introduced on 1/8/2019 by Representative Ann G. Eshoo (CA-18)

Bill reauthorizes certain programs under the Public Health Service Act and the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act with respect to public health security and all-hazards preparedness and response, to clarify the regulatory framework with respect to certain nonprescription drugs that are marketing without an approved drug application, and for other purposes. 1/10/2019 Read the second time. Placed on the Senate Legislative Calendar under General Orders.

*S.99 A bill to amend title XVIII of the Social Security Act to provide for the negotiation of lower covered part D drug prices on behalf of Medicare beneficiaries and the establishment and application of a formulary by the Secretary of Health and Human Services under Medicare part D, and for other purposes.

*S.22 Medicare Central Benefit Act of 2019
